Meeting Minutes of the Parks and Recreation Committee
Village Hall, 118 W Cook Avenue, Libertyville
Tuesday, July 5, 2016

Chairman Todd Gaines called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, July 5, 2016.

Parks and Recreation Committee members in attendance included Chairman Todd Gaines, Trustees Pete Garrity and Rich Moras. Recreation and Sports Complex staff included Director of Recreation and Sports Complex Connie Kowal, Recreation Manager Julie Ludwig and Administrative Secretary Julie Fanning. Also in attendance included Mayor Terry Weppler, Village Administrator Kevin Bowens and Superintendent of Parks, Forestry and Grounds Jim Barlow.

1) Minutes of the Parks and Recreation Committee

Chairman Todd Gaines motioned to approve the Tuesday, June 7, 2016 meeting minutes. Trustee Pete Garrity seconded. Minutes approved.

2) Dog Days of Summer

Director Kowal noted that the Dog Days of Summer event is on schedule. Director Kowal will invite Mr. Kaiser to the August meeting to discuss the event. Chairman Gaines commended Mr. Kaiser for his efforts on the event coordination for the festival.

3) Hockey Rink Relocation Update

Village Engineer Fred Chung presented the elevation drawing for the potential hockey rink at Adler Park. Fred explained that with the combined retaining wall and hockey boards there would be a considerable drop on the south end portion of the rink. Additionally a retention pond would have to be placed on the south end of the rink approximately 1.5 acres in size. The bike path would have to be moved north of the current location that would affect the current tree line. With the information presented, the Committee suggested that the Sports Complex location be reviewed for a potential location. It was noted in correspondence from Community Development Director John Spoden that the Sports Complex was developed under a Special Use Permit and Superintendent Jim Barlow noted that the potential green space area at the Libertyville Sports Complex was fairly flat as it was designed as an overflow parking lot. Trustee Moras reiterated that the Committee is looking at the Libertyville Sports Complex location as a potential site but no final decision has been made as the Committee and Staff are in the planning process. Additionally more parking would have to be added to the 74 lost spots from the hockey rink to account for the hockey patrons.

Director Kowal noted that the current Libertyville Sports Complex business operations still require overflow parking for major event parking. Additionally, if the Golf Learning Center is sold, the Golf Learning Center parking would be unavailable unless the agreed purchaser allows shared parking during the Libertyville Sports Complex events which could be difficult to arrange on a consistent basis.

Wendy Vieth, 1509 Juliet Lane, explained that she frequents the Sports Complex during the winter months. The traffic for the drop off and pick up lane is backed up to the Golf Learning Center due to the busy Sports Complex facility usage. Mrs. Vieth asked if the Village would consider creating a better drop off area and reconfiguring the entire parking lot to accommodate for the extensive traffic at the Libertyville Sports Complex.

Director Kowal continued discussion on location, planning and construction of the possible hockey rink, and explained that most likely the hockey rink will not be open for the winter 2016 season. He suggested utilizing a baseball field such as Odom as a location for a multiuse facility including a baseball field and seasonal hockey rink. Director Kowal also suggested approaching private business entities that may have additional land to be used. Mayor Weppler suggested that the liability of the private business offering

land to the Village could be too high. The Committee noted that Odom would not be a good location. The two other locations in Adler Park are considered a floodplain and there is also a storm sewer.

Mayor Wepler informed the Committee and staff that a plan will need to be completed prior to submitting to the Plan Commission. Fred Chung will request of meeting with the Director of Community Development John Spoden to discuss further regarding the plan submission.

Staff will develop a plan for the Sports Complex northwest end parking overflow space for a potential hockey rink location including a topographical survey, engineering information and analysis of additional parking spaces at the south end fire line and the east end of the Sports Complex. Director Kowal thanked the hockey rink supporters for their continued support and meeting attendance.

4) Butler Lake Sunken Garden

Director Kowal explained that the water fountain will be rebuilt and a plaque will be added to the fountain honoring resident Valerie Carlson for her beautification and maintenance of the Butler Lake Sunken Garden. Once the project is completed, the Village will arrange a ceremony with the family members.

5) Other Updates

A) Libertyville Senior Center Update

Director Kowal briefed the Committee that the part time Senior Center Assistant Coordinator was posted on the Village site.

B) EAB Progress Update

Superintendent Barlow noted that the in house removals will begin in August.

C) Libertyville Golf Course

No updates regarding the Libertyville Golf Course litigation with BCS Golf. Director Kowal noted that there could be possible interest from outside golf management businesses to run the golf course but it would be the Village paying for the management and operation of the golf course. Mayor Wepler asked what it would cost to fix the former golf course to playable condition and noted that the past Village maintenance Village costs was approximately \$80,000 annually. Trustee Garrity asked staff research the cost associated with making the golf course playable. Staff will try to contact Mr. Jacobson who was the designer/architect for the Sports Complex Driving Range to get his feedback.

D) Libertyville Recreation and Sport Complex Event Schedule

Director Kowal summarized the upcoming schedule of events for the Recreation and Sports Complex Department. Director Kowal explained that the IFN (Islamic Foundation North) prayer service will be held beginning of July.

E) Recreation & Sports Complex Marketing & Publicity

Director Kowal highlighted the various marketing and publicity efforts for the department.

A motion to adjourn by Chairman Todd Gaines and seconded by Trustee Pete Garrity.
Meeting adjourned at 7:11 pm.





Subject: Libertyville Golf Course Update

Staff has discussed some of the areas that need to be addressed in order to have the Libertyville Golf Course ready for the Village or a golf management company to operate for public play.

The greens, sandtraps and teeboxes for all nine holes need to be repaired and rebuilt. Staff has contacted golf course architect Rick Jacobson of Libertyville based Jacobson Golf Course Design, Inc. Mr. Jacobson is familiar with the Libertyville Golf Course. He is part of a group from the non-profit The First Tee organization that looked into the usage of the Golf Course for its kids golf programs. Mr. Jacobson also was the designer/architect for the LSC Driving Range. We look to receive some general information, costs, etc. from Mr. Jacobson soon.

Staff also notes the fact that an irrigation system will be needed. The irrigation system and pump house at the Golf Course was very old and had several issues in the 2010-2012 golf seasons due to antiquated pipes. The system was shut down during the 2013 golf season since the BCS management company indicated no need of the system due to their installation of artificial greens, tees and sandtraps. Staff estimates that a minimal cost of low six-figures will be needed to install an irrigation system to service the 9-hole course.

The Village no longer has the equipment to mow and maintain the golf course, as this equipment was sold. A golf course management company would need their own equipment to operate the golf course.

Subject: Hockey Rink Relocation Update

At the July meeting, the Parks & Recreation Committee directed Staff to explore the feasibility of relocating the Bolander Hockey Rink to an area of land at the Libertyville Sports Complex. The area of land is adjacent to the LSC Softball Field at the northwest corner of the LSC campus.

Current Status and Usage of Area

Currently this grass area is designated for parking lot usage with approximately 74 parking spots to be created if/as needed at the LSC with this land bank area.

Usage of Area For Special Events

This area has been used on occasion by the LSC to attract, and accommodate, major rental events that need extra parking, in addition to the current parking capacity at the LSC. This area has also been used by customers when events or activities take place at the same time or overlapping times. In the past 12 months, major rental events that needed usage of this area included:

<u>Event</u>	<u>Usage</u>	<u>Revenue</u>
IFN Religious Event	1 day, 2 events a year	\$3,500 (per event)
High School Graduation	1 day, 1 event per year	\$8,000
Major Sports Festival	3 days, 1 event per year	\$20,000

With the pending loss of the parking spots in this area, adjustments would need to be explored regarding this overflow parking need so as to maintain and keep these revenue driven events. Alternative areas for overflow parking include the grass tee area of the Driving Range on the south end of the LSC campus, rental arrangement of parking lots of adjacent businesses in the Route 45 corridor with use of shuttle busses, and use of grass area northwest of miniature golf course parking area. On a couple weekend occasions in the past, Staff has received permission to use the parking lots of businesses across the street directly west of Route 45 and using the Sheriff Department for traffic control and pedestrian/vehicle street crossing.

Footprint of Hockey Rink at LSC

Village Engineer Fred Chung has submitted a layout of the land area to accommodate a Hockey Rink. The land bank area would need to be deferred at another location on the LSC property. This area would also include some parking spots to accommodate hockey usage and general LSC parking. See attached.

Continued

Deferring of Land Bank Parking Spaces at LSC

To accommodate the loss of 74 land bank parking spaces, Staff identified the east side of the LSC building as an area to defer the loss of these 74 land bank parking spaces. Attached is a layout of this area.

Topographical Survey of LSC Site

Gewalt Hamilton has been retained to provide a topographical survey for this grass site area for the Hockey Rink. We are awaiting results of their findings.

Community Development Assessment

See attached memorandum from Community Development Director John Spoden as to the next steps for the approval process.

Summary

Staff believes the relocation of the Bolander Hockey Rink to the LSC is feasible. Water and electrical services for the Hockey Rink are currently available at the adjacent LSC Softball Field. Equipment to maintain the ice hockey component of the Hockey rink can be stored at the LSC. Changes and adjustments will need to take place as to the operations, usage and hours of the hockey rink due to other events, activities and programming that will take place at the LSC campus. The loss of this parking area will cause adjustments to the needs of 3 major events that require this parking area. Lastly, in the event of a sale of the Miniature Golf Course property and/or the Driving Range property at the LSC, the need to accommodate for the loss of parking spots will need to be addressed to continue current business operations at the LSC campus.

Connie:

The Sports Complex was developed under a Special Use Permit and Planned Development. The final plans included the land-banked parking area which is to be preserved as landscaped open space. (This is not listed as a specific condition as it is outlined in the parking section of the Zoning Code.)

If the proposal is to eliminate the land-banked parking area it would require an Amendment to the Planned Development Final Plan. The Village Board would determine if it would require the review and recommendation of the Plan Commission. If there was not sufficient room on the campus to relocate the land-banked parking area, Staff would recommend that the issue be forwarded to the Plan Commission. However, as the Engineering Division has shown on the submitted site plan, there is ample room to the east of the main building to relocate the land-banked parking. As such, the Community Development Staff recommendation is that the proposal would not need to proceed to the Plan Commission and the Amendment to the Planned Development Final Plan could be addressed at the Village Board level.

The Village of Libertyville is searching for property to relocate an ice hockey/roller hockey rink that was previously located at the Village Bolander Park property on Winchester Road. As you may be aware, that property was recently sold and the rink was disassembled and stored while the Village looks for a new location.
